

- The learners will be tested on their previous knowledge of functional grammar (of all the levels) in the Half-Yearly and Annual Examinations.
- The Supplementary Reader is divided into two parts for the two Terms.
- The students will be assessed for **6 marks** from the Supplementary Reader in Term end Examinations (Half-Yearly and Annual) in the 'Language paper'.
- The students must be encouraged to read the Supplementary Reader on their own.


