

- The learners will be tested on their previous knowledge of functional grammar (of all the levels) in the Mid Term Assessments, Half-Yearly and Annual Examinations.
- The students will be tested for 6 marks from the prescribed topics of Supplementary Reader in Term End Examinations (Half-Yearly and Annual) in the 'Language paper'.
- The students must be encouraged to read the remaining stories to develop their skill of story appreciation.
- Students are expected to read the prescribed topics from the Supplementary reader independently at home and prepare accordingly. The topics are not to be taught in the class.
